Implementation

Two years ago, Wyld adopted Connect Master Management.

Students' grades consist of: 80% Exams and Comprehensive Final Exam; 10% Connect Master Chapter Quizzes, and 10% Connect Master Homework. As homework, Wyld uses Adaptive Learning Assignments, Application-Based Activities, and Reading Assignments, and includes Topic-level Quizzes and Tests/Exams from the Connect Master Question Banks. He strongly encourages students to complete the Connect homework activities and says,

Results Achieved




Figure 1: Comparison of Total Grades for Course

The results prove that Connect Master helps students learn and succeed. After switching to Connect Master, on average 18% more students earned an "A" when compared to the platform used in the previous term (Figure 1).



As the semester progresses, the impact of Connect Master on student learning gets more and more evident. At the start of the semester, in exams 1 and 2, student grades are similar. However, starting from exam 3, on average, students are getting 7 points more on the exams. Overall, the exam scores with Connect Master are 7.4% points better than with the previous platform (Figure 2). In fact, 100% of the students surveyed say Connect Master was effective and helped them to acquire knowledge and skills necessary for future courses as well as for their careers.

Conclusion
