From carpenters and engines


From carpenters and engineers to teachers, chefs, and clerks.

Long ago, our country was new. We needed a plan for making laws. So our leaders wrote the Constitution.




#### But something was missing.

the widest, too!


To see how tall they really are, let's compare them to some of our other national treasures!




Freedom's Bell
