- Each day, ask your child to tell you one thing he or she has learned. Some helpful conversation starters are, "What activity did you choose during playtime today?" or "What was your favorite thing you did today?"

- Keep paper, pens, and pencils available for writing. Ask your child to write something each day. Ideas include notes to you, short stories, letters to friends and family, grocery lists, or lists of household chores.
- Find an interesting place to take your child for a special trip. Many places
  offer special tours for young children, like the fire station, a local museum, or
  factories.
- Play board games and card games with your child. Games like checkers and dominoes help your child learn strategic thinking skills.
- Enroll in an arts and crafts class with your child. Talking about how different materials look and feel is a great way to encourage language development.
